

FIFE LABOUR MARKET UPDATE

APRIL 2024

This monthly update reports on the number of people in Fife claiming out-of-work benefits ([the claimant count and claimant rate](#)). It also provides data on the area’s latest unemployment rate (people without a job but who are seeking work) and economic inactivity rate (people who are neither working nor seeking work). All data shown are provisional and subject to revision.

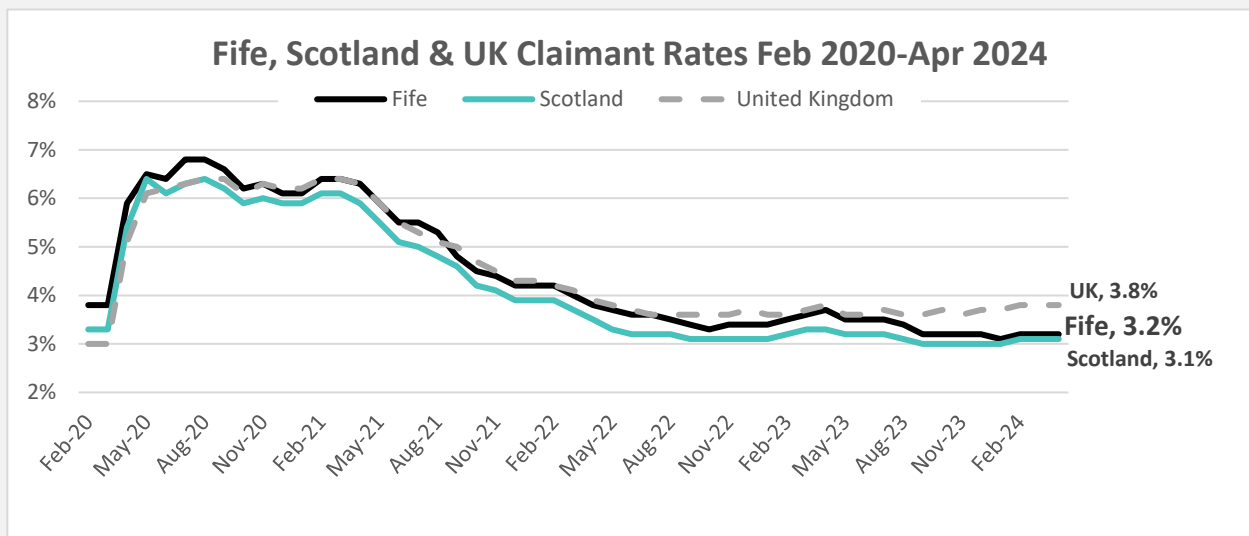
1.1 CLAIMANT RATE

In April, **Fife’s claimant rate remained unchanged at 3.2%** although the number of people claiming out-of-work benefits in the region fell by 70 from 7,525 to 7,335. Fife’s April claimant rate was 0.5 percentage points lower than a year ago in April 2023 (3.7%), and 0.6 percentage points lower than its pre-pandemic February 2020 rate (3.8%).

1.2 UNEMPLOYMENT RATE

In the 12 months to December 2023, Fife's unemployment rate fell from the 3.7% recorded during the previous period (Oct 2022-Sep 2023) to 3.5%. An estimated 6,200 people aged 16 and over were unemployed, 500 fewer than the previous period (Oct 2022-Sep 2023). In the 12 months to December 2023, Fife's employment rate marginally increased from 75.0% to 75.5%. Over the same period, the employment rate for Scotland as a whole fell from 75.2% to 74.7%.

1.3 ECONOMIC INACTIVITY

Around 48,900 people or 21.8% of Fife's working age population were 'economically inactive' in the year ending December 2023. This is less than the previous period (22.3% of the working age population (WAP) in the 12 months to September 2023), less than the record high of 60,900 people (26.9% of the WAP) who were economically inactive in the year ending June 2022 and is lower than prior to the Covid pandemic. Long term ill-health was the reason given for not being in employment or seeking work by a third of those who were economically inactive in Fife (an estimated 16,100 people). An estimated 11,100 people – 22.8% of those who are economically inactive - wanted a job.

2.0 PROFILE OF FIFE'S OUT-OF-WORK BENEFIT CLAIMANTS

2.1 Breakdown by Type of Claimant

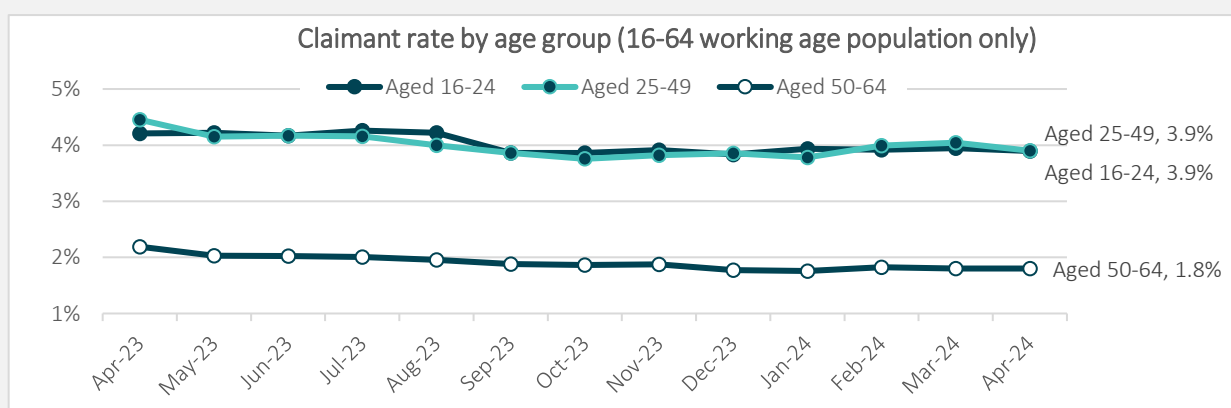
An estimated 198 fewer people claimed Universal Credit while searching for work in Fife compared with the previous month and 1,152 fewer than a year ago in April 2023. There were 5 more Job Seeker's Allowance claimants compared with the previous month but 45 fewer than a year ago.

All age groups (apart from the 50-64 years age group) saw the number of people claiming out-of-work benefits fall compared with the previous month, **claimant numbers in all age groups were lower than a year ago.**

2.3 Breakdown by Gender

There were 105 fewer women claiming out-of-work benefits than in March, and 85 fewer men.

The male claimant rate (3.9%) still remains significantly higher than the female rate (2.5%).

2.4 Breakdown by Fife's Local Committee Areas

In this areal breakdown, the monthly and annual change is given for the claimant count and rate for each of Fife Council's seven [Area Committees](#). For the claimant rate, the change represents the difference in percentage points between the previous and current claimant rate.

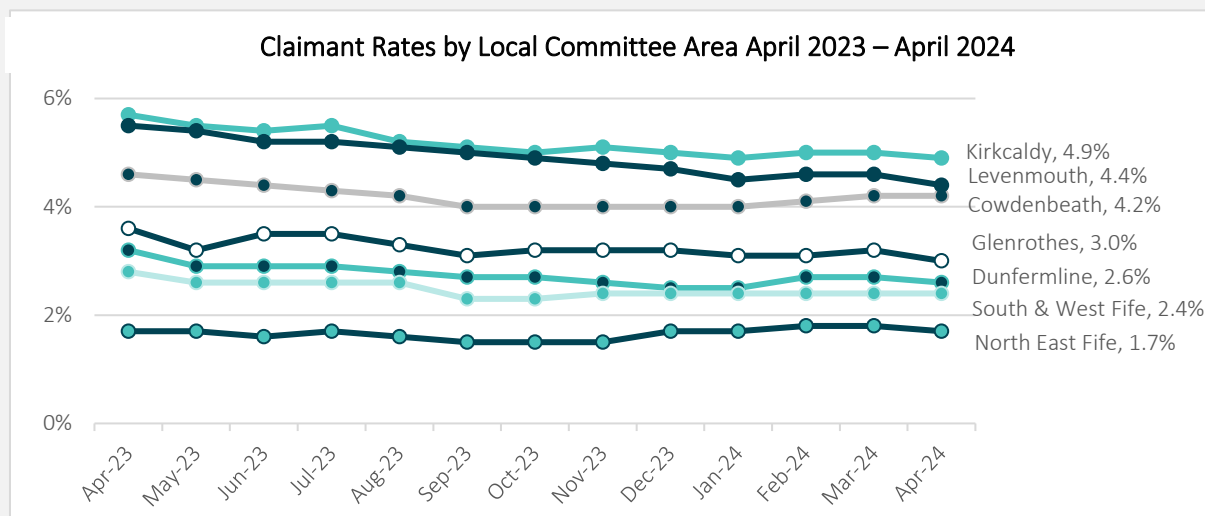

In all parts of Fife, the number of people claiming out-of-work benefits fell between March and April apart from in the South & West committee area where claimant numbers rose.

All committee areas had fewer people claiming out-of-work benefits and lower claimant rates than a year ago.

The Kirkcaldy Area, Levenmouth and Cowdenbeath had the highest numbers and rates of people claiming out-of-work benefits and North East Fife and South & West Fife had the lowest.

In all areas of Fife, the number and rate of men claiming out-of-work benefits were both higher than the number and rate of women.

The greatest differences were in **Levenmouth**, where the male claimant rate was nearly twice as high as the female rate, followed by the **Cowdenbeath and Kirkcaldy Areas**. The difference was lowest in **South & West Fife**.

Kirkcaldy Central, Buckhaven, Methil & Wemyss Villages and Kirkcaldy East remain the electoral wards with the highest claimant rates in Fife.

3.0 CLAIMANT RATES IN FIFE'S CITY REGIONS

Fife is part of two City Region Deals – the [Edinburgh & SE Scotland City Region Deal](#) and the [Tay Cities Region Deal](#). This section shows the percentage of working age residents claiming out-of-work benefits in each of the local authorities that make up the two City Regions.

3.1 Edinburgh & South East Scotland City Region

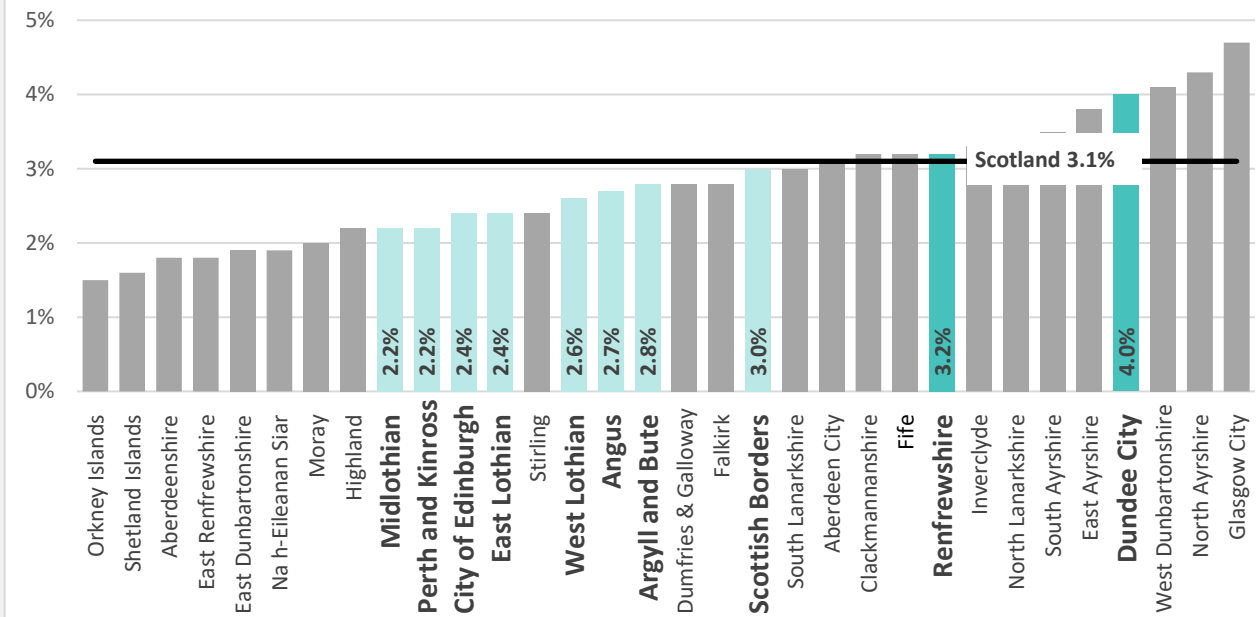
In April, claimant rates fell compared with the previous month in **all parts of the Tay Cities Region** and in **Midlothian, the Scottish Borders and West Lothian** in Edinburgh & SE Scotland City Region.

North East Fife was the only part of both city regions where the claimant rate was not lower than a year ago.

Fife and Dundee were the only City Region Local Authorities whose claimant rates were above the Scottish rate.

Note: The Tay Cities Region captures North East Fife only, and the Edinburgh & South East Scotland City Region covers an area in the South and West of Fife as indicated on the maps. Care should be taken when using these geographies.

CLAIMANT COUNT STATISTICS

The claimant counts and claimant rates given in this update are based on experimental data collected by the Office for National Statistics (ONS). The claimant count represents the number of people claiming Jobseeker's Allowance plus the number of people on Universal Credit who are required to search for work and are available for work.

Universal Credit replaces six legacy benefits and tax credits (including Jobseeker's Allowance and Income-related Employment and Support Allowance) and was fully introduced in Fife on 6 January 2017 after initially going live in the region in April 2016.

Universal Credit requires more people to look for work than was the case for legacy benefits; new claimants who are waiting on or appealing Work Capability Assessments are also required to look for work.

The claimant count dataset is still classified by the ONS as experimental statistics. These figures are also not seasonally adjusted so that each month's figures will be influenced by seasonal effects. Please note that care should therefore be taken when analysing and interpreting the figures.

Claimant Count, Jobseekers Allowance and Universal Credit statistics are provisional on their date of release and are subject to revision.
