

FIFE LABOUR MARKET UPDATE - JULY 2026

This quarterly update reports on the performance of Fife’s labour market presenting the latest data on **People in Work** (rates of employment, the number of employees and earnings); **People Out of Work** (unemployment and inactivity rates along with the number of people in Fife claiming out-of-work benefits); and the number and type of **Job Postings**.

PEOPLE IN WORK

1.0 Employment Rate

As shown in Table 1, during the 12 months to March 2026, an estimated **73.5% of people aged 16 to 64 years in Fife were in work**. This was lower than the employment rate during the same period the previous year (75.1%), and around the same as the rate prior to the pandemic in 2019/20 (73.7%).

In comparison, the estimated Scottish employment rate (74.6%) was slightly higher than the previous year but also lower than before the pandemic.

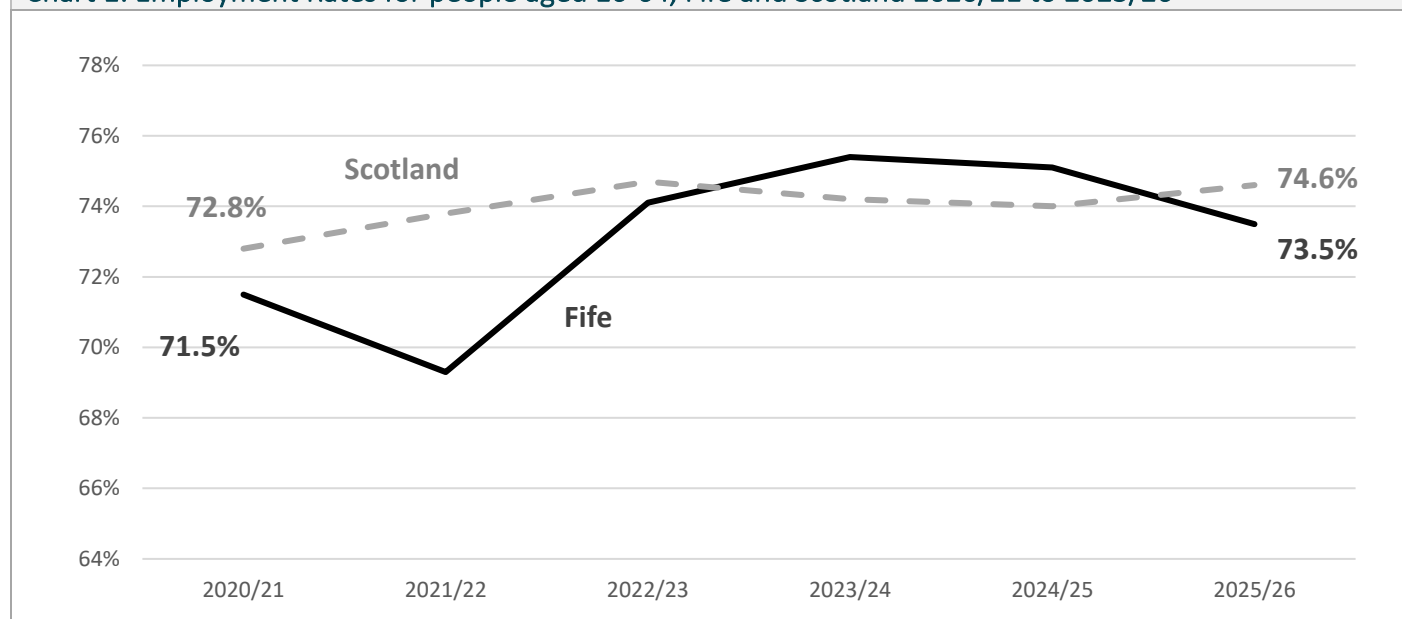
Fife’s employment rate fell to slightly below the Scottish rate after having been higher in 2023/24 and 2024/25 (Chart 1). It is also more volatile than the Scottish rate, which could be related to the fact that Fife estimates are less robust than those for Scotland due to smaller sample sizes at the sub-national level.

Chart 1: Employment Rates for people aged 16-64, Fife and Scotland 2020/21 to 2025/26



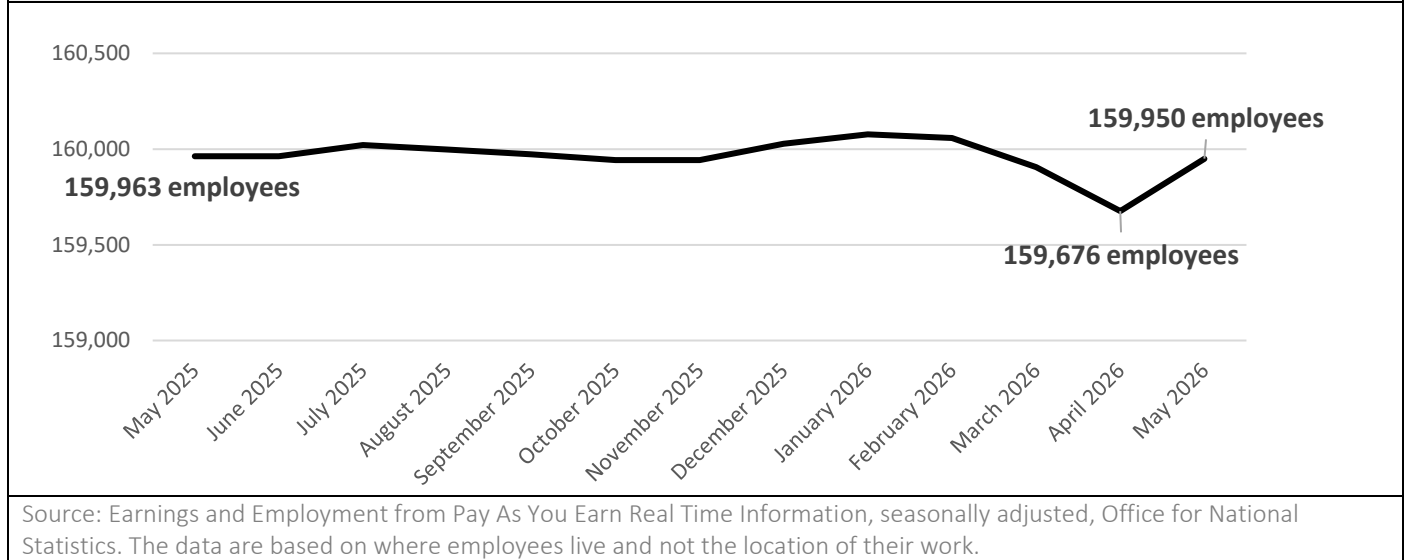

2.0 The Number of Payrolled Employees

In May 2026, there were an estimated **159,950 payrolled employees in Fife**, -13 (or 0.0%) less than the same period the previous year (May 2025). Between May 2025 and May 2026, the number of payrolled employees in Scotland as a whole fell by -0.3%.

The number of payrolled employees in Fife increased by 274 jobs (+0.2%) between April and May 2026, whilst remaining the same in Scotland overall.

Chart 2: Number of payrolled employees living in Fife May 2025 - May 2026

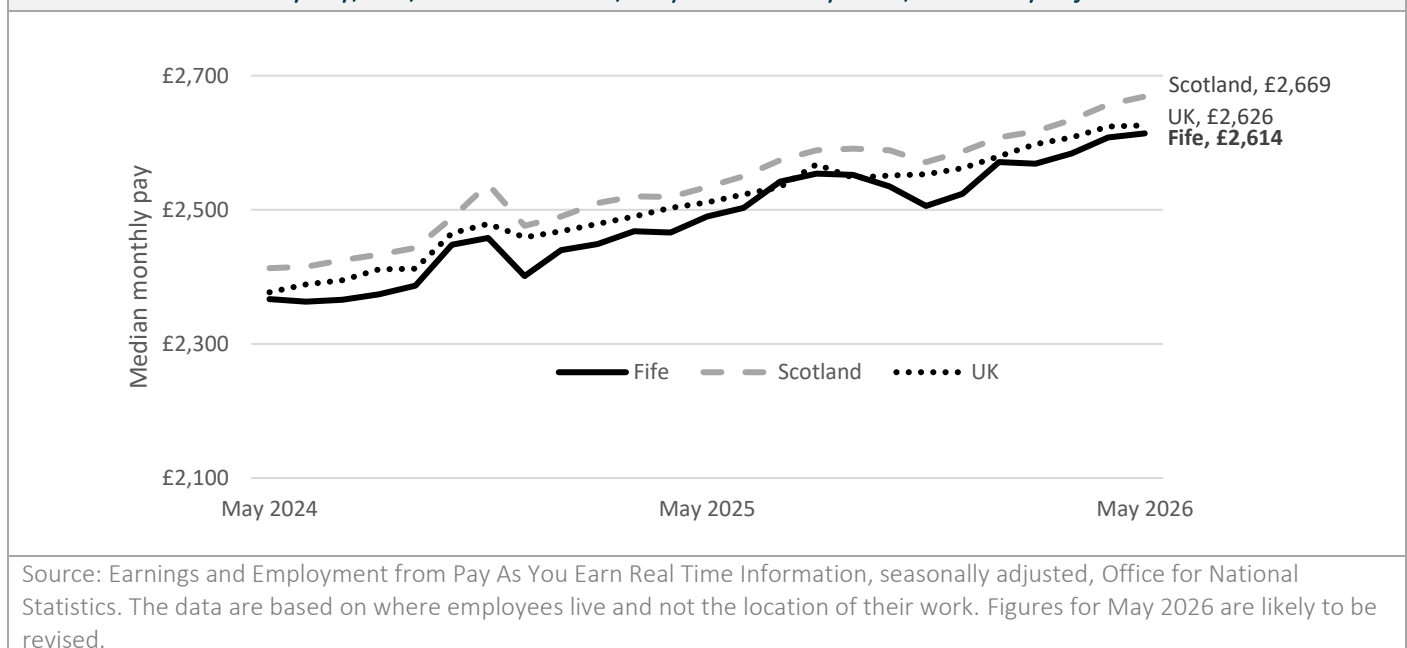


3.0 HMRC EARNINGS

The latest estimates for May 2026 indicate that median monthly pay for payrolled employees in Fife was £2,614, an increase of 5.0% in nominal terms compared with the same period the previous year. This is slightly lower than the annual growth in median monthly pay for payrolled employees in Scotland (+5.3%) but higher than overall growth in the UK (+4.6%) over the same period.

The latest estimated Fife median monthly pay is lower than those for Scotland and the UK (Chart 3).

PEOPLE NOT IN WORK

4.0 Unemployment Rate

In the 12 months to March 2026, Fife’s unemployment rate was higher than the same period the previous year but lower than the unemployment rate for Scotland as a whole. An estimated 7,000 people aged 16 and over were unemployed in Fife over this period.

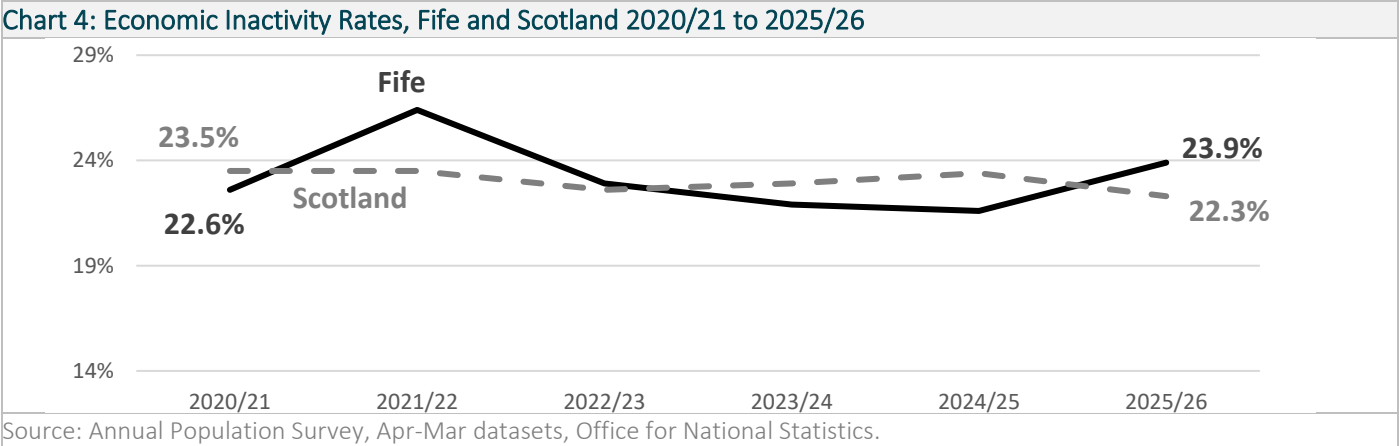

5.0 Economic Inactivity Rate

An estimated 54,400 people in Fife, 23.9% of the area’s working age population, were ‘economically inactive¹’ during the year ending March 2026. This is more people than the same period the previous year (49,000) and more than in 2019, prior to the Covid pandemic (53,100). Fife’s economic inactivity rate rose above the Scottish rate in 2025 after falling below it in 2023/24 and 2024/25 (Chart 4). Fife’s rate is also more volatile than the Scottish rate, which could be related to the fact that Fife estimates are less robust than those for Scotland due to smaller sample sizes at the sub-national level.

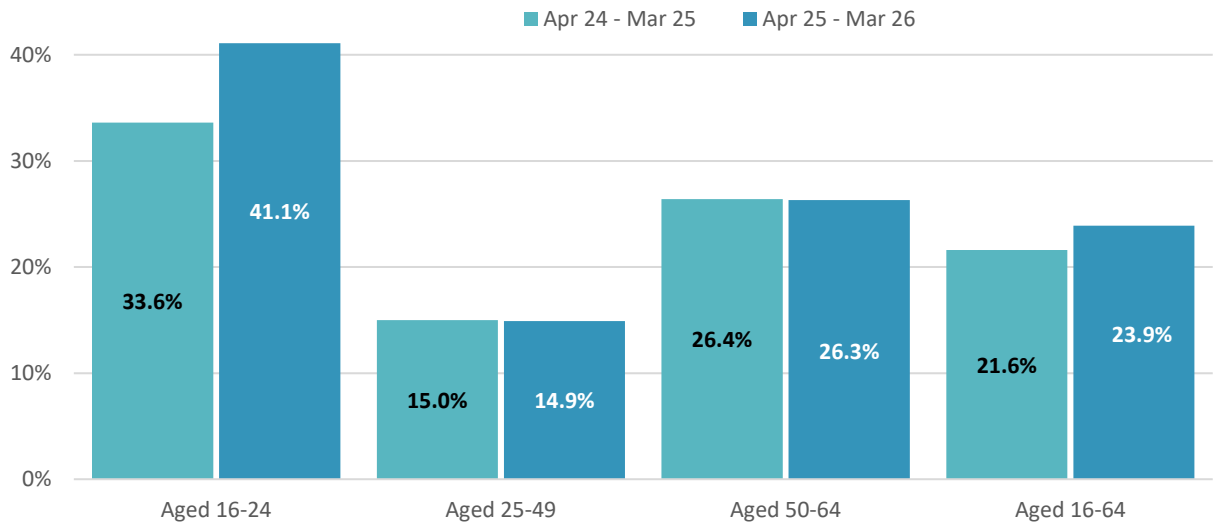
¹ Those who are economically inactive are people aged 16 and over without a job who have not sought work in the last four weeks and/or who are not available to start work in the next two weeks, ie they are neither employed nor unemployed. Economic inactivity estimates at the Fife level should be viewed with caution due to small sample sizes.

5.1 Economic Inactivity Rate by Age

The 16-24 age group had the highest rate of economic inactivity (41.1%) and the 25-49 age group the lowest (14.9%) during the 12 months to March 2026 (Chart 5).

Between 2024/25 and 2025/26, the proportion of people aged 16-24 who were economically inactive increased significantly.

Chart 5: Economic inactivity rates in Fife by age group, 2024/25 and 2025/26



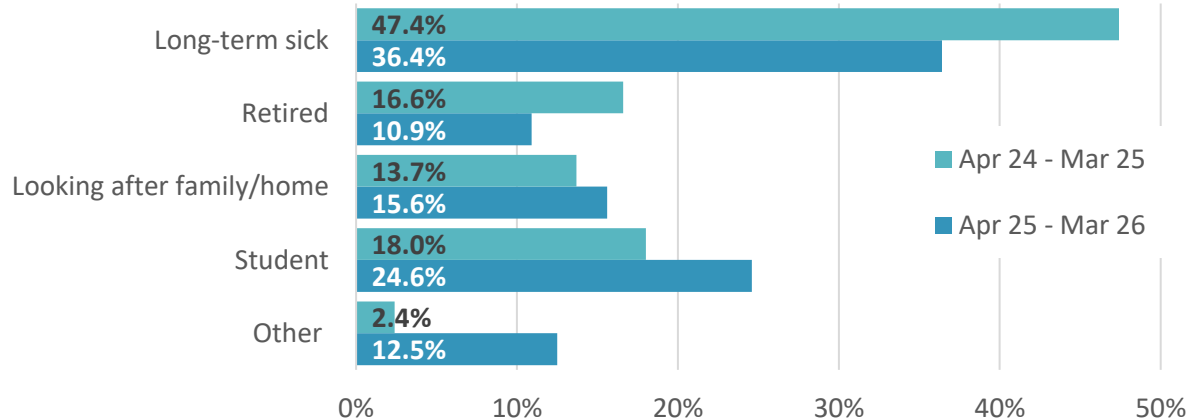

5.2 Economic Inactivity Rate by Reason for Inactivity

Long-term ill-health was the main reason given for not being in employment or seeking work in Fife. In 2025/26, 36.4% of inactive people aged 16 to 64 (an estimated 19,800 people) gave their reason for being inactive as 'long-term sick or disabled' (Chart 6). This was higher than the Scottish rate (34.2%) but fewer people than the same period the previous year (an estimated 23,200 people).

Between 2024/25 and 2025/26, the number and proportion of inactive students and those with caring responsibilities increased while the number and proportion of people inactive due to retirement and long-term ill-health fell.

6.0 Claimants of Out-of-Work Benefits (Claimant Count)

The information in this section is based estimates of the number of people claiming unemployment-related benefits collected by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) in its Claimant Count dataset. Due to the provisional nature of the latest monthly statistics (for June 2026), the average claimant counts and claimant rates for the last quarter (Apr-Jun 2026) are given for sections 6.2 – 6.6. All data are rounded to the nearest 5 and totals may not therefore equal the sums of breakdowns.

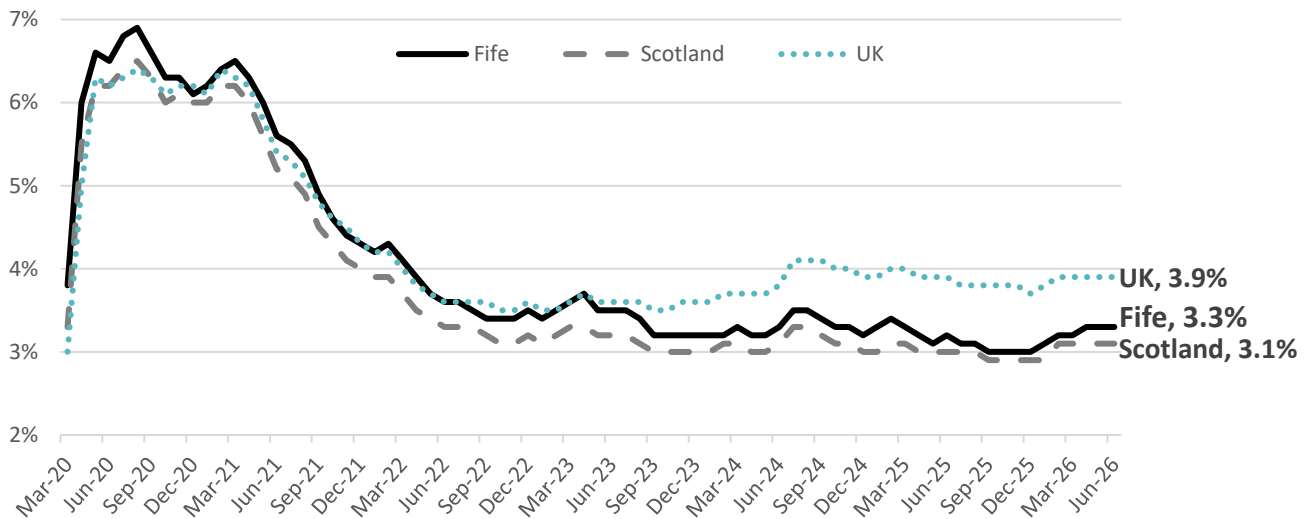
6.1 Fife, Scotland & UK Claimant Rates March 2020 - June 2026

After falling significantly in 2021 and 2022, the number and rate of people claiming out-of-work benefits in Fife has remained fairly steady. (Chart 7).

In June 2026, Fife's claimant rate was 3.3% with an estimated 7,525 people claiming out-of-work benefits in the region.

Fife's claimant rate has been below the 2019 pre-pandemic rate of 3.8% since May 2022. Fife's claimant rates are consistently higher than the rates for Scotland as a whole, but are below the UK rates.

6.2 Profile of Fife's Out-of-Work Benefit Claimants

6.2.2 Age Profile

The 16-24 year old age group had the highest average claimant rates (4.2%) (Table 5).

There were more out-of-work benefit claimants in all age groups compared to the previous quarter. The 25-49 year old age group was the only age group to have fewer claimants than the same period a year ago.

6.2.3 Gender Profile

Fife's male claimant rate (3.9%) was significantly higher than the female rate (2.6%) (Table 6).

Both genders saw claimant numbers increase over the quarter and year.

6.3 Breakdown of Claimants by Fife's Local Committee Areas²

Claimant rates and numbers rose in all parts of Fife compared with the previous quarter apart from in Dunfermline, North East Fife and South & West Fife.

In all areas, claimant rates were also higher than a year ago apart from in North East Fife.

The Kirkcaldy Area had the highest number and rate of people claiming out-of-work benefits; North East Fife and South & West Fife had the lowest.

6.4 Breakdown by Gender and Local Committee Area

The number and rate of men claiming out-of-work benefits were both higher than the number and rate of women in all areas of Fife.

The greatest difference was in Levenmouth followed by the Cowdenbeath and North East Fife. The difference was lowest in South & West Fife and Dunfermline.

6.5 Breakdown by Age and Local Committee Area

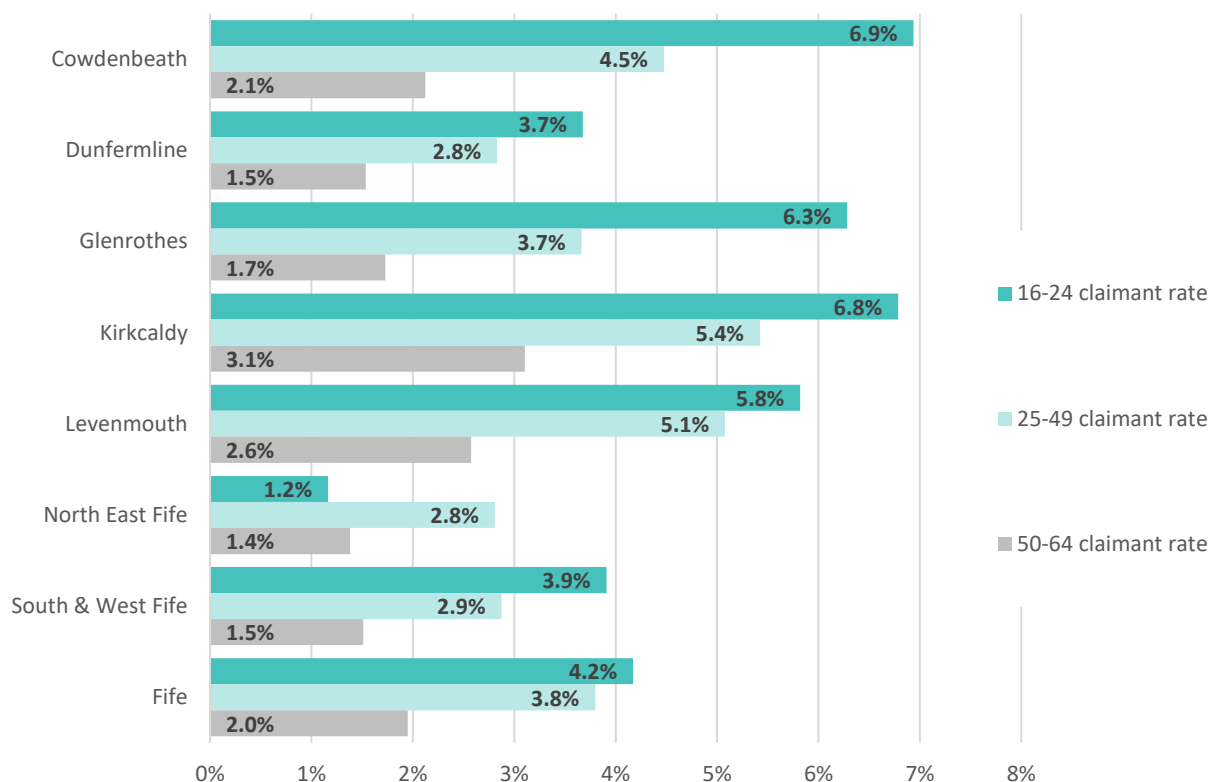
In all parts of Fife, with the exception of North East Fife, **16-24 year olds had the highest rate of people claiming out-of-work benefits** of the three main working age groups (Chart 8).

In Cowdenbeath and the Glenrothes and Kirkcaldy Areas, over 6% of young people aged 16-24 years were claiming out-of-work benefits.

North East Fife had a particularly low 16-24 year old claimant rate (1.2%).

Dunfermline and North East Fife had the lowest claimant rate for people aged 25-49 years (2.8%) followed by South & West Fife (2.9%).

6.6 Breakdown of Claimants by Electoral Ward

Kirkcaldy Central, Kirkcaldy East and Buckhaven, Methil & Wemyss Villages remained the electoral wards with the highest claimant rates in Fife.

JOB POSTINGS³

7.0 Number and Type of Job Postings

There were 9,828 unique postings for jobs in Fife between April and June 2026. This was 15.6% or 1,325 more job postings than the previous quarter (January - March 2026) and 15.2% more than between April - June 2025.

The median advertised salary was £14.06 per hour.

Employment Activities⁴ saw the largest number of job postings followed by Human Health Activities (Table 10).

Care Workers & Home Carers were the most posted occupation followed by Cleaners & Domestics. (Table 11).

DATA SOURCES

The data used in this update come from the following sources:

Annual Population Survey

The Office for National Statistics' (ONS) Annual Population Survey (APS), which combines results from its Labour Market Survey with English, Welsh and Scottish boosts, provides data on employment, unemployment and economic inactivity.

Data are obtained from a sample survey and are therefore subject to some error. In addition, over the last several years, and particularly since the pandemic, sample sizes have fallen dramatically. The ONS states that although the APS estimates are robust at a national (Scottish) level, there are concerns with the quality of estimates for smaller groups of the population, for example local authority level estimates. Users are therefore advised to note the increased uncertainty around the estimates for employment, unemployment and economic inactivity.

Earnings and Employment from Pay As You Earn Real Time Information, seasonally adjusted

This Office for National Statistics dataset provides earnings and employment statistics from Pay As You Earn (PAYE) Real Time Information (RTI) at the UK, NUTS 1,2 and 3 areas and local authorities each month - [Earnings and employment from Pay As You Earn Real Time Information, seasonally adjusted - Office for National Statistics](#). The data are based on where employees live rather than the location of their work and are official statistics in development.

Claimant Count

Claimant counts and claimant rates given in this update are based on experimental data collected by the Office for National Statistics. The claimant count represents the number of people claiming Jobseeker's Allowance plus the number of people on Universal Credit who are required to search for work and are available for work.

Universal Credit replaces six legacy benefits and tax credits (including Jobseeker's Allowance and Income-related Employment and Support Allowance) and was fully introduced in Fife on 6 January 2017 after initially going live in the region in April 2016.

Universal Credit requires more people to look for work than was the case for legacy benefits; new claimants who are waiting on or appealing Work Capability Assessments are also required to look for work. In addition, from May 2024, the Department for Work and Pensions rolled out an increase in the administrative earnings threshold for full work search conditionality.

The claimant count dataset is still classified by the ONS as experimental statistics. These figures are also not seasonally adjusted so that each month's figures will be influenced by seasonal effects. Please note that care should therefore be taken when analysing and interpreting the figures.
